The first question is about ethnicity, not race or ancestry. No matter what you selected for that question, you must answer the second question to indicate your student's race or races.

Here are some examples about the racial categories:

- ❑ **American Indian or Alaska Native** A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, including Mexico, South America, and Central America, and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment. Examples: Azteca, Zapotec, Maya, Nahua, Aymara, Kichwa, Lakota, Navajo, Guarani.
- ❑ **Asian** A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent including the peoples of Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam.
- ❑ **Black or African American** A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.
- ❑ **Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander** A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.
- ❑ **White** A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa. Examples: **Middle Eastern** A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Egypt, Israel, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Palestine, Syria, or Turkey. **Spanish** A person having origins in any of the peoples of Spain.

### Why do Hispanic/Latino students need to identify a race?

Hispanic populations are growing and it is important to have accurate ethnic and racial counts. The U.S. Census Bureau found that Hispanic reporting was more accurate with separate questions asking about ethnicity and race. Respondents were less likely to confuse race with country of origin.

We have many Hispanic students who ask, "Both my parents are Hispanic—what race should I choose?"

Race isn't the same as a language or cultural group. Hispanic populations are racially diverse—a person may be a Spanish-speaker from Peru but be of White, Asian, African or American Indian ancestry. For example, the Bolivian president, Evo Morales, is of indigenous Aymara or American Indian lineage, while the former president of Peru, Alberto Fujimori, is of Japanese or Asian lineage.

How should we interpret the official description of American Indian as someone "who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment"? Does it mean that only officially recognized tribal members can select American Indian as their race?

The official description confuses the idea of ancestry—yes, my mother's parents were Indigenous—with current legal definitions of tribal membership as they have been established in the United States—no, I'm not a member of the Anishinaabeg people with certain legal rights recognized by treaty.

*A person does not have to be a recognized tribal member to select "American Indian." Note that the official description also includes people descending from the original peoples of North, Central and South America. It really comes back to recognizing that the categories are limited, but it is up to the parents and students to choose the categories they feel best describe their original ancestry.*
